Second Sunday In Ordinary Time

The end of the Christmas season was marked by the Baptism of the Lord, January 8th this year, and we have now moved into the season of Ordinary Time. Despite its name, there is nothing inherently "ordinary" about this season of the year. The term ordinary is just used because the weeks are numbered in an ordinal way-the Third Week in Ordinary Time, the Fourth Week in Ordinary Time, and so on. Liturgical calendars were not always structured in this way. In the earliest days of the Church, every Sunday was treated as an Easter Sunday-there was no distinction in the season for Christmas, Lent, and Easter. While we no longer treat every Sunday as Easter Sunday, "Sunday is the pre-eminent day for the liturgical assembly. In addition to participating in the Eucharistic liturgy, in Ordinary Time, Sundays remain days that should be set aside for prayer, reflection, rest, and time with family.

Stewardship Reflection For Sunday January 14, 2024-: The Second Sunday In Ordinary Time
Our readings today focus on the vital attributes of being a disciple of Christ. Our First Reading from
Samuel unfolds the relationship between Samuel and the Lord. If we put ourselves in Samuel's shoes, we
can wonder how many times the Lord has spoken to us but we did not recognize His voice. God's voice
might already be present in the quiet of our hearts, in Scripture, or even in speaking through someone else.
He speaks to us in various forms, but to recognize that it is Him, we must give Him a portion of our time by
being still and listening to what He is calling us to do or not do.

Our journey as disciples of Christ is an ongoing adventure. To grow on this journey, we can seek first the Kingdom of God, listen to God's voice in our lives, and be good stewards of what He has gifted us. With that, the Lord will respond with "Come, and you will see!"

The Week of Prayer For Christian Unity:

This Thursday January 18th begins the Week of Prayer For Christian Unity and will conclude on Thursday January 25th. The theme for this year is "You shall love the Lord your God... and your neighbor as yourself," from the Gospel of Luke 10:27. This theme highlights the call for charity, mercy, justice, and unity in inter-communal relations. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity has a history of over 100 years, in which Christians around the world have taken part in an octave of prayer for visible Christian unity. By annually observing the WPCU, Christians move toward the fulfillment of Jesus' prayer at the Last Supper "that they all may be one." (cf. John 17:21)

Prayer for the Week Of Christian Unity:

We pray, O gracious Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit, that we all may be one as you are one. In your community of complete unity, we have our beginning and our end. To you we pray, asking for the gift of visible unity among all who believe in your Christ. Be Ready to do God's Will

In today's first reading, God called young Samuel in a special way. Samuel's life had been dedicated to God, and because he was willing to follow God's plan, God made Samuel a holy prophet.

In the Gospel reading, Saint John the Baptist tells his followers that Jesus is the Messiah. Two of them decided to follow Jesus, and one of them, Andrew, went and got his brother Simon. When Simon went to follow Him, Jesus told him that his name would now be "Cephas," or "Peter," which means 'rock.' God had a special plan for Simon Peter. He was to become the leader of the Church- the first pope!

God does not call all of us to very important jobs like the prophet Samuel and Saint Peter. But each of us should follow Jesus and be ready to do His will. If we always try to do what God wants, then we will be ready if He does have a special job for us! How can you do God's will today?
