Echoes of a Polish Christmas:




Stewardship Reflection For Sunday December 31, 2023- Feast of the Holy Family

Today we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. They are a model for all families! And just as the Holy Family is holy, our families too are called to be holy. This may seem like a daunting task at times! Yet, as Christian stewards we know that this holiness is achievable by living as disciples of Christ. Our Gospel today says a great deal about trust and surrender to our Lord – two trademark words of a steward. As the Holy Family brought the infant Jesus to the temple, they encountered two key individuals, Simeon and Anna. Upon seeing the Infant, both praised the Lord, rejoiced in the coming of their Savior and prophesized about what was to come. It says, "the child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him." We can imagine that two parents would be taken aback by these words! Yet, through all of this, the Holy Family surrendered their lives to God and had unwavering faith and trust in His plan. Thankfully, they did, because the fulfillment of this plan meant the salvation for man! Believe it or not, God has a plan for our lives too. Oftentimes, we get in the way of what He has in store for us. Although our plan might be 'good', God's plan is great and will fulfill our hearts more than we could ever have imagined. Like the Holy Family, we just need to trust, surrender and be attentive to God's voice. As we celebrate this Christmas season with joy and gladness for our Savior, let us deepen our commitment to Him through the love and service we give our family members, and the trust and surrender we place in God to take care of us each day.



A Plenary Indulgence is Available with Visits to Certain Parishes this Christmas:

Although the welcome mat is out at all parishes in the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown this Christmas season, there is a special incentive for local Catholics to visit a parish that is under the ministry of a Franciscan priest. In celebration of the 800th anniversary of Saint Francis of Assisi creating the first Nativity scene in Greccio, Italy, which included live animals and people recreating the humble, yet magnificent birth of Christ, Catholics who visit a Franciscan parish and pray before the Nativity scene in that church can receive a plenary indulgence. This indulgence was approved by the Apostolic Penitentiary at the direction of Pope Francis. The indulgence, which is a remission of the temporal punishment for sins, is available until February 2, 2024 — the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. Besides visiting the church and praying before the Nativity, one must, as usual, celebrate the Sacraments of Eucharist and Reconciliation and pray for the Pope's intentions. Those who are ill or otherwise physically unable to visit a church during this time may receive an indulgence by offering their sufferings to the Lord and through prayer. Among the parishes in the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown blessed by Franciscan ministry and presence, and therefore appropriate locations to visit to receive the indulgence, are Our Lady of Mount Carmel, Holy Rosary, and Saint Mark in Altoona, Saint Francis of Assisi, Saint Anne, and Saint Therese of the Child Jesus in Johnstown, Holy Family in Colver, Saint Anne in Davidsville, Saint Gregory in MacDonaldton, Saints Philip and James in Meyersdale, Saint John Vianney in Mundys Corner, Saint John the Baptist in New Baltimore, Saints Peter and Paul in Philipsburg, Holy Family in Portage, Saint Michael in St. Michael, and Saint Anthony of Padua in Windber. "As the Franciscan family celebrating the centenary of the Christmas at Greccio, we are invited to pause before the mystery of the Incarnation in order to contemplate the depth of God's love for humanity," noted Father Christopher Panagoplos, TOR, one of many Franciscan priests serving in the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown. "Let us raise our awareness of daily life, with all its joys and difficulties, as a privileged place of encounter with the Lord."



Did You Know? In its present form the custom of displaying figures depicting the birth of Jesus Christ owes its origin to St. Francis of Assisi, who made the Christmas crèche or manager for Christmas Eve of 1223.



Prayer for the New Year



On New Year's Eve or New Year's Day, the household gathers at the table or at the Christmas tree or manger scene. Many people make New Year's Day a day of prayer for peace.

All make the sign of the cross. The leader begins:

Let us praise the Lord of days and seasons and years, saying:

Glory to God in the highest!

R/. And peace to his people on earth!

The leader may use these or similar words to introduce the blessing:

Our lives are made of days and nights, of seasons and years,

for we are part of a universe of suns and moons and planets.

We mark ends and we make beginnings and, in all, we

praise God for the grace and mercy that fill our days.

Then the Scripture is read, Book of Genesis 1:14-19:

Listen to the words of the Book of Genesis:

God said: "Let there be lights in the dome of the sky, to separate day from night. Let them mark the fixed times, the days and the years, and serve as luminaries in the dome of the sky, to shed light upon the earth." And so it happened: God made the two great lights, the greater one to govern the day, and the lesser one to govern the night; and he made the stars. God set them in the dome of the sky, to shed light upon the earth, to govern the day and the night, and to separate the light from the

darkness. God saw how good it was. Evening came, and morning followed—the fourth day.

(The family's Bible may be used for an alternate reading such as Psalm 90:1-4.)

Reader: The Word of the Lord. R/. Thanks be to God.

After a time of silence, members of the household offer prayers of thanksgiving for the past year, and of intercession for the year to come. On January 1, it may be appropriate to conclude these prayers with the Litany of the Blessed Virgin Mary (in Part VII: Litanies) since this is the solemn feast of Mary, Mother of God. In conclusion, all join hands for the Lord's Prayer. Then the leader continues:

Let us now pray for God's blessing in the new year.

After a short silence, parents may place their hands on their children in blessing as the leader says:

Remember us, O God; from age to age be our comforter.
You have given us the wonder of time, blessings in days and nights, seasons and years. Bless your children at the turning of the year and fill the months ahead with the bright hope that is ours in the coming of Christ.
You are our God, living and reigning, forever and ever.
