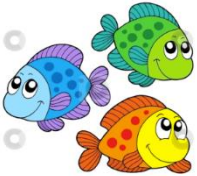
### Word Of God Sunday

#### Sunday of the Word of God:

Today (**January 265th**), is the **Sunday of the Word of God**. This observance, which is marked on the third Sunday of Ordinary Time each year, was established by Pope Francis in 2019, in the apostolic letter Aperuit illis (“Opened to them”). Its purpose is to devote time and emphasis to the celebration, study, and sharing the Word of God, because the relationship between the risen Jesus Christ, the church and sacred Scripture is essential to who we are as Christians. For Catholics, some important considerations are: That Sunday Mass is a time when people are nourished by Word AND Eucharist. Every sacrament is founded and constructed upon the Word of God. Every proclamation of the Word of God is sacramental. The liturgical reform following Vatican II greatly increased people's appreciation of the role of the Word of God in every liturgical celebration, while the three-year lectionary led to far more scripture being proclaimed during liturgies and a better understanding of the importance of the Word of God people's spirituality. This observance is a time to think about the Word of God, ie Scripture, and also to consider how the Word is honored in the church's worship, symbolically in the books that Scripture is proclaimed from, and practically in the effort put into preparing readers, and making the environment a good one in which to share and reflect on scripture.

#### Explaining God’s Word:

Be sure to get your **FREE** copy of Explaining God’s Word weekly in the back of the church. These engaging full-color lessons explain the Sunday Gospel to pre-school through 2nd-grade children (through First Eucharist) with the interaction children need and love. Every week, “Simon the mouse” provides a delightful commentary that our youngest parishioners can understand. Explaining God's Word includes age-appropriate games and activities for in-pew, home or classroom use. Take one home for yourself or a friend. Available year-round

**All Saints in Boswell to Present A Talk By Italian Garden Project Founder:**

Many people remember the beauty and charm of traditional Italian American (and other old immigrant generation) backyard vegetable gardens. All Saints Parish in Boswell will host a talk about those old-time gardens and learn about their relevance for reconnecting to our food, our families, and God’s creation. Mary Menniti (pictured above), founder of The Italian Garden Project, will share how these gardens serve as glimpses into the past that can lead to a brighter future. Growing up with an Italian immigrant grandfather, Mary came to know and value his self-reliant lifestyle, his careful use of resources, and his extensive gardening knowledge. Mary founded The Italian Garden Project to preserve old-world food and gardening traditions and demonstrate that the wisdom Italian American vegetable gardeners possess is highly relevant today. Due to her efforts, an Italian American vegetable garden is now digitally archived in the Archives of American Gardens at the Smithsonian Institution. Since its founding, the Project has offered educational programs on a wide range of topics including heirloom seed saving, fig tree growing, and foraging. Her work has been featured on NPR, PBS, and media outlets throughout the United States and Italy. The talk will be on **February 23 at 6:30 p.m. at All Saints Parish Hall, 505 Center Street, Boswell**.
