Solemnity Of The Epiphany Of The Lord

“**Epiphany: this word indicates the manifestation of the Lord**, who, as Saint Paul tells us in Eph 3:6, makes himself known to all the nations, today represented by the Magi. In this way, we see revealed the glory of a God who has come for everyone: every nation, language, and people and is welcomed and loved by him. It is symbolized by the light, which penetrates and illuminates all things.”



The blessing of homes on Epiphany is a very Old Catholic custom. When the Wise Men or Magi became an important focus of the celebration of epiphany, the blessing of homes was a natural conclusion. The Wise Men came to bring gifts to honor the King of Kings; but when they entered the home at Bethlehem, he whom they came to bless blessed them! To dedicate our home to Christ is to gain untold blessings from him who manifested himself in glory to the world on Epiphany. Have each family member gather round the door to your home and with a piece of chalk, above the entrance, mark **20+C+M+B+26**. (The numbers are the year and the letters stand for the wise men, Balthasar, Casper, and Melchoir).

After completing the above markings, pray the following prayer:
May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us; and may we seek and serve in everyone we meet, that same Jesus who is Lord of all people, forever and ever.Amen

Did You Know ?

The legendary names of the three Maji are: Casper, Melchoir, and Balthasar. The initials **C+B+M** also stand for their Latin words, “Christus Mansionem Benedicat” which means: “**May Christ bless this dwelling.**”

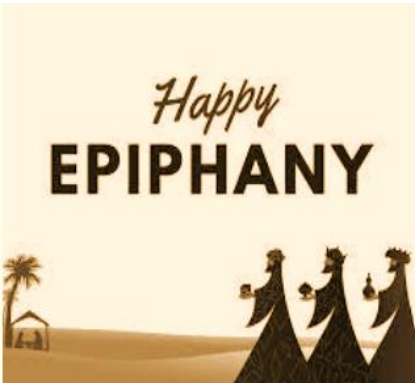
Religious Education News:

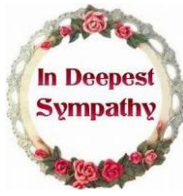
67th Magnificat Meal:

Stewardship Reflection January 4th – Solemnity Of The Epiphany Of The Lord
As our celebration of Christmas continues, this week we observe the great feast of The Epiphany of the Lord. The word ‘epiphany’ comes from Greek and means manifestation of appearance. The stewardship way of life is one in which we live in grateful response to God’s countless manifestations in our lives. As Christian stewards, we are all called to manifest God’s love to each other in the sharing of our gifts. St. Paul describes this beautifully in our second reading in his letter to the Ephesians, saying, “You have heard of the stewardship of God’s grace that was given to me for your benefit…” We have all been given unique and wonderful gifts from our good and generous God. He wants us to share these gifts to benefit others and so to give Him glory. Let us rejoice in God’s manifestations in our lives and be watchful for the new ways He is calling us to share ourselves and our gifts in gratitude to our King in the year ahead.

What the Gifts of the Magi Tell Us about Jesus:

- 1. Gold – the Kingship of Jesus:**
The gold represents Jesus’ kingship. Jesus’ kingship transcends all earthly rulers – the Magi recognized that, and they came to worship him.
- 2. Frankincense – the Deity of Jesus:**
The frankincense represents Jesus’ deity. In the Old Testament, frankincense was traditionally burned in the temple as an offering to God (Leviticus 2:2). By bringing this gift, the Magi affirmed Jesus was no ordinary man; he is both fully man and fully God.
- 3. Myrrh – the Death of Jesus:**
Commonly used to embalm bodies, the gift of myrrh foreshadows Jesus’ death. We see in John 19:38-40 that Nicodemus brought myrrh at the time of Jesus’ burial: In this way, the full story of Jesus’ coming is revealed. Jesus was born so that we might have salvation. Through Jesus’ death, we have eternal life.

The Magi’s Gifts: Pointing to the Ultimate Gift: The gifts of the Magi illuminate the different aspects of Christ’s identity. He is king, he is God, and, in his marvelous grace, he died, so that we might live. As the Magi actively pursued Jesus, so too should we follow Christ without hesitation, letting him be our guiding star.

Prayer for the New Year

On New Year's Eve or New Year's Day, the household gathers at the table or at the Christmas tree or manger scene. Many people make New Year's Day a day of prayer for peace.

All make the sign of the cross. The leader begins:

Let us praise the Lord of days and seasons and years, saying:

Glory to God in the highest!

R/. And peace to his people on earth!

The leader may use these or similar words to introduce the blessing:

Our lives are made of days and nights, of seasons and years, for we are part of a universe of suns and moons and planets.

We mark ends and we make beginnings and, in all, we praise God for the grace and mercy that fill our days.

Then the Scripture is read, Book of Genesis 1:14-19:

Listen to the words of the Book of Genesis:

God said: "Let there be lights in the dome of the sky, to separate day from night. Let them mark the fixed times, the days and the years, and serve as luminaries in the dome of the sky, to shed light upon the earth." And so it happened: God made the two great lights, the greater one to govern the day, and the lesser one to govern the night; and he made the stars. God set them in the dome of the sky, to shed light upon the earth, to govern the day and the night, and to separate the light from the

darkness. God saw how good it was. Evening came, and morning followed—the fourth day.

(The family's Bible may be used for an alternate reading such as Psalm 90:1-4.)

Reader: The Word of the Lord.

R/. Thanks be to God.

After a time of silence, members of the household offer prayers of thanksgiving for the past year, and of intercession for the year to come. On January 1, it may be appropriate to conclude these prayers with the Litany of the Blessed Virgin Mary (in Part VII: Litanies) since this is the solemn feast of Mary, Mother of God. In conclusion, all join hands for the Lord's Prayer. Then the leader continues:

Let us now pray for God's blessing in the new year.

After a short silence, parents may place their hands on their children in blessing as the leader says:

Remember us, O God;
from age to age be our comforter.
You have given us the wonder of time,
blessings in days and nights, seasons and years.
Bless your children at the turning of the year
and fill the months ahead with the bright hope
that is ours in the coming of Christ.
You are our God, living and reigning, forever
and ever.
R/. Amen.
