Liturgical Reflection For 5th Sunday Of Lent:

The readings on this 5th Sunday of Lent tells us that God can bring us from death to new life. The First Reading tells us of God’s desire to restore life in us. The Second Reading tells us that if Christ dwells in us, we will have new life as He does. As we draw near to the end of Lent, today’s Gospel clearly has Jesus’ passion and death in view. The Gospel of John tells us about Lazarus’ sister, Mary – that she is the one who anointed the Lord for burial (John 12:3,7). When Lazarus is raised, it is noticed that the tombstone is taken away, as well as Lazarus’ burial cloths and head covering – these details are echoed with Jesus’ empty tomb (John 20:1,6,7). Lazarus represents humanity. He stands for a “dead man” – for all those Jesus loves and wants to liberate from the bands of sin and death. Lazarus’ death is used by Jesus to reveal ‘the glory of God’. Jesus’ command to ‘rise from the dead’ demonstrates his Lordship and that when we believe in Him, we are totally unbound and free from the things that bind us. If we believe, we will see – that Jesus loves each of us as He loved Lazarus, that He calls us out of death and into new life. By His Resurrection Jesus has fulfilled Ezekiel’s promise in today’s First Reading. He has opened the graves that we may rise, put His Spirit in us that we may live. The same Spirit that raised Jesus from the dead will give life to we who were once dead in sin. Faith is the key. If we believe as Martha does in today’s Gospel, that Jesus is the Resurrection and the Life – even if we die, we will live. Let us, therefore, doubt no further and believe in Him!

True and Perfect Joy- From the writings of St. Francis of Assisi:

The same (Brother Leonard) related in the same place that one day at Saint Mary's, blessed Francis called Brother Leo and said: "Brother Leo, write." He responded: "Look, I'm ready!" "Write", he said "what true joy is." "A messenger arrives and says that all the Masters of Paris have entered the Order. Write: this isn't true joy! Or, that all the prelates, archbishops and bishops beyond the mountains, as well as the King of France and the King of England (have entered the Order). Write: this isn't true joy! Again, that my brothers have gone to the non-believers and converted all of them to the faith; again, that I have so much grace from God that I heal the sick and perform many miracles. I tell you true joy doesn't consist in any of these things." Then what is true joy? I return from Perugia and arrive here in the dead of night. It's winter time, muddy, and so cold that icicles have formed on the edges of my habit and keep striking my legs and blood flows from such wounds. Freezing, covered with mud and ice, I've come to the gate and, after I've knocked and called for some time, a brother comes and asks: 'Who are you?' Brother Francis, I answer. 'Go away!' he says. 'This is not a decent hour to be wandering about! You may not come in! When I insist he replies: 'Go away! You are simple and stupid! Don't come back to us again! There are many of us here like you-we don't need you!' I stand again at the door and say: 'For the love of God, take me in tonight!' And he replies: 'I will not! Go to the Crosiers' place and ask there!' "I tell you this: If I had patience and did not become upset, true joy, as well as true virtue and the salvation of my soul, would consist in this.

As we journey ever closer to the powerful days of Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and the Passion and Resurrection of our Lord, let us intensify our Lenten resolutions and our stewardship way of life. Let us invite the Holy Spirit to take over more and more of our lives. By Easter, we will be freer to rejoice in Him and truly pleasing to God.
